Donating property with the expressed purpose of generating revenue for the museum:

 In the case of property donated to generate revenue, the donor may deduct the amount generated for the museum by the sale of the property to the extent of the law.

Automobile Donations

Gifts make the collection

Automobiles have been given to the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum since its inception in 1974. Seventy percent of the current exhibited collection is composed of donations to the museum. (Others are privately owned cars on loan.)

Donating to the Permanent Collections:

- Exhibit Collection: Automobiles in fine condition are given to the Permanent Collections for exhibition in the thematic galleries. The autos must fit the mission of the museum, the subject of a gallery, and be in exhibitable condition, or desirable enough to merit restoration. This collection consists of the best examples of their type.
- Education-Use Collection: Cars deemed appropriate to use for educational purposes. They may be driven to destinations, and students and adults alike may be invited to sit in and experience the automobile.

Donors may choose to donate vehicles for the specific purpose of generating revenue:

- Donors may specify at the time of donation that they are donating an automobile to the museum for the express purpose that it be sold and the money used for a specific purpose. This decision must be directed by the donor.
- The revenue is generated through equal-opportunity public sale of the vehicle(s).

Integrity makes the collection

If an automobile is donated to the collection, it stays in the collection. The Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum follows the National Standards and Best Practices for U.S. Museums as established by the American Alliance of Museums.

Rest Assured:

Automobiles (or any other artifact) donated to the permanent collection will NOT be sold to generate revenue for the museum to operate.

In accordance with museum best practices, the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum ethics policy does not permit it to sell its collection artifacts and use the money to fund its operations.

In the extremely rare and unlikely incident that an object is officially removed from the permanent collection, through any means including insurance claim, sale, or trade, proceeds will be directed towards the purchase of another object for the collections, or the care of the existing collection. No object from the collections will be officially removed from the permanent collection for the primary purpose of generating revenue.
